A large elephant.  A vest made from spider's webs.  A handkerchief the size of a car park.  A bill from the wand shop.  A bucket full of stars and planets, to mix with the dark night.  A bag of magic mints you can suck for ever.  A snoring rabbit.</p> <p>This is a different sort of list poem as the lines are of different lengths and there are no rhymes. Some lines have extra information and adjective, noun phrases to amaze, amuse or shock.</p> <p><b>2. How is this poem different to The Younger Brother?</b> Record how on paper. Look at the objects in Younger Brother. They are all concrete objects (real life and believable.) You would find most of them in your pocket!
